“Stronger Together”

Babe Ruth said: “The way a team plays as a whole, determines its success. You may have the greatest bunch of individual stars in the world, but if they don’t play together, the club won’t be worth a dime.”

I am not much of a sports follower, especially baseball. I do know the name of Babe Ruth. And although my knowledge base of his success is limited, I know something about Babe Ruth as being one of the most successful players of the game. His expertise, skill and longevity surpassed most individual players of his day. Collectors of baseball memorabilia are still excited for all things associated with the player named Babe Ruth.

His name denotes the game of baseball. Yet, this quote from the man himself points away from the individual to the value he placed on the teamwork of the whole. Babe Ruth concludes, “When individuals, talented and experienced as they may be, are willing to work with others as a team, then success is theirs – together.” Babe Ruth had it right.

Many years ago, I worked in a congregation where the adult choir included 50 voices and a professional, talented director. The individual members of this church choir were very talented, many sang in semi-professional settings. They should have produced the most beautiful music for the worship services. Unfortunately, their sound as a choir was always a little off. This choir had a difficult time making beautiful music together. The notes were right, everyone on key and to perfection musically. But their sound was not inspirational nor inviting. They did not work together – as a team. Even their musical talents and experience would not overcome the way that they treated one another. They did not know what the Babe knew – that team work is the path to success.

They competed with each other. Some of the most experienced members of the choir claimed the positions of influence. They wanted the music to be the same as it had always been because it was the ‘right’ music for church. These choir members would say that the ONLY way to praise God was to sing Bach and Beethoven, never Gaither nor Sleeth.

They struggled to respect each other and they were unwilling to open themselves to leadership. As the saying goes, ‘you can lead a horse to water, but you can’t make him/her drink.’ So was the case in this choir. The Director was hired to guide, to teach, to lead, to mentor the individual

musicians into a cohesive body called a choir. Individuals resisted and a team never materialized. The music suffered and God's glory did not shine.

They didn't listen. For some reason, the individual choir member didn't receive what others had to say nor sing. They were always a step ahead, rhythmically off and chaos ensued. Listening was key to singing together. Trusting each voice to blend was too difficult. Somehow, with all their experience and talent, some members of the choir were never willing to trust themselves and to trust others and to trust God.

This choir was not the only group of individuals who struggled with the concept of teamwork. Jesus' disciples had their moments of difficulty in relationship and team building. Remember the story when a few of the disciples started to compete for the place - sitting next to Jesus in glory? Or what about the argument among a few disciples who wanted confirmation on who was the favorite? Also, we can't forget Judas whose authoritative sense of self compelled him to question spending money for fine oils and ointments for use on Jesus' feet, instead of giving to the poor. (And we know where Judas ended up.)

We can't forget the difficulty all of the disciples had with their listening skills. They kept asking Jesus to tell them, "what does this mean?" If only they had listened with willingness to receive and be shaped by what they heard. Some of them had to go the hard path of experience first, understanding later.

Somehow these flawed human beings, named disciples of Christ, became the very ones to shine God's Light into the world. They matured, they learned; they changed; they accepted the responsibility to share with others. When Jesus called out to them as individuals, Jesus saw their potential. Jesus guided, taught, mentored, shaped, loved them into a relationship that changed them into a 'team' - now known as the Body of Christ - the church.

Jesus had it right. It is the team - the community - the Body of Christ - the church who will be successful in sharing the love and light of God in the world. Together, we are stronger. And together, we will succeed in Christ name. I look forward to our teamwork together.

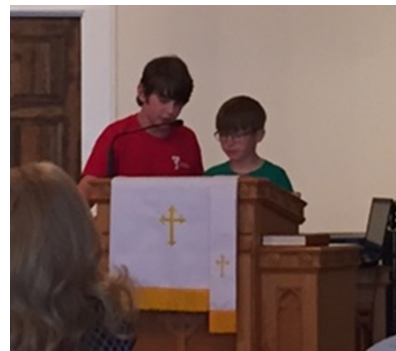
Youth News
